The Museum of the North's collections include many carved objects. Since ancient times, people have carved tools and everyday objects they needed to survive, as well as cultural artifacts and artwork. In Alaska, many carvings are made from antler, wood, soapstone, ivory, or bone.

Iñupiaq children played with these toy kayaks and umiaks, carved from wood and ivory.
